One of the new, exciting family offerings we've introduced as part of our commitment to increase our reach and impact is Siblings' Day, dedicated to the brothers and sisters of young people at Chailey Heritage Foundation. It's a chance for them to let loose, have fun, and connect with others who understand their unique experiences.

Jess, one of our managers, who has recently trained with Sibs, the charity for siblings of those with disabilities says, "Siblings of children with disabilities often have a different experience of childhood, growing up in a world where much of the focus is on their brother or sister. That's why we've created this day so they can have time to be themselves, make friends, and enjoy some well-deserved fun."

Our first Siblings' Day in February welcomed 16 children, from primary to secondary school age. The fun began with a lively parachute game in the Dream Centre for the primary age siblings, while the secondary aged siblings took part in an art session where they created vibrant masking tape paintings to take home. Then came the highlight - an all-in game of Laser Tag!

After working up an appetite, Domino's pizzas were a massive hit at lunch, giving the children a chance to relax and chat.

Lauren Humphreys, Family Liaison Worker, says,

"We built in plenty of downtime so the children could bond naturally. Meeting another sibling who just 'gets it,' without needing to explain can be incredibly liberating." The afternoon saw more fun, with football and hula hooping in the riding area. Then came a special visit from Reptylerz, bringing along an amazing collection of animals including a skunk, a tarantula and a giant snake that stretched across the classroom floor!

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The day was a huge success, one parent fed back - "Thanks so much for yesterday's sibling event. My child had a great time and has been full of stories about what an amazing day it was. He loved every activity and Domino's pizza was the cherry on top! Greatly appreciated, thanks so much."

Jess and Lauren reflect, "We wanted siblings to have pure fun and we did just that! It's about building confidence, friendships, and trust. If they ever need to talk, they'll know we're here for them." 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
Building The Bradbury Den, with the community, for the community...



Patchwork Farm is a well-used and much-loved facility at Chailey Heritage Foundation, created as one of the specialist services which helps the children and young people supported by the charity to achieve their next steps in education, communication, physical therapies and wellbeing. The farm was also conceived as a wonderful opportunity to engage with the wider community through farm visits, volunteering and work experience. Everyone at Chailey is excited that we are now embarking on the next stage of the farm's evolution by creating a unique learning and community space, called "The Bradbury Den." This sustainably designed, low-carbon facility will be built using locally sourced materials and provide a year-round resource for both the young people at Chailey and our community. It will maximise the positive impact that spending time with the animals and plants on the farm has for all of us.

We have already consulted with a range of community and wildlife stakeholders on the design of the building, which will include a huge habitat wall, straw bale construction, a rammed chalk wall and a green roof that will mirror the grass meadows of the South Downs.

As we move into the construction phase of the project, we will be continuing to ask our community to get stuck in. The Den building process will involve "Barn Raising" style opportunities for local groups and individuals who fundraise for us to roll up their sleeves and assist with elements such as the straw bale insulation, wooden shingles and the rammed chalk wall.



Once the building is complete the Den will:

- weave indoor and outdoor spaces together, bringing the local habitat into the building and connecting directly with the existing barn
- reduce the number of timetabled farm sessions the children and young people at Chailey miss due to the weather, which is up to 50% in winter months
- provide a unique community resource for local schools, charities, community groups, businesses and even for children's birthday parties.

A Bright Start at Futures for Dom

Dom, a lively and outgoing 22-year-old, joined Futures, our residential provision/service for young adults at Chailey Heritage Foundation last summer after attending Treloar's College. His mum recalls, *"When Dom left Treloar's, there wasn't anything suitable nearby. Then I learned about Futures, and I knew it would be the perfect stepping stone into the wider world for him."*





Dom lives with several complex health conditions, including Myofascial Pain Syndrome, Cerebral Palsy, Global Development Delay, a visual impairment, seizure disorder, and Sleep Apnoea. Yet, he approaches life with enthusiasm, always finding joy and connection in every experience.

His journey at Futures began with a sunny welcome party attended by family, friends and support staff in the garden of Nightingale Bungalow, where he now lives. Dom has quickly immersed himself in the wide range of activities available at Futures and the Leisure and Skills Centre (LSC) including gym sessions, swimming, cooking, art, music, yoga, sensory activities, and rebound therapy. His support team reflect, "It's such an achievement to see him so happy and relaxed so soon after joining Futures."

Dom has enjoyed a residential trip to London, visiting a Winter Wonderland, the zoo, and an immersive art experience.

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These trips help young people connect with peers and staff while sharing fun moments, like takeaway evenings. Dom's mum praises the team at Futures:

"CHF has far exceeded our expectations. The staff are fantastic - when Dom could no longer use a standing frame, they immediately arranged for him to try a standing sling, which he loves because he can move around."

Dom has made many friends and attended the Futures Winter Ball, enjoying the disco and looking sharp in his party attire. Amy, his activities coordinator, says, "He's a real social butterfly who brings humour and joy to every moment."

His family say knowing Dom is happy has given them peace of mind. "We are so confident in his care that we even holidayed abroad, which wouldn't have been possible without the Futures team."

We are thrilled to see Dom flourishing at Futures and look forward to his continued journey!

Brighter Days Ahead – our commitment to sustainability





We're taking a big step toward a greener future!

As part of our sustainability journey, we've installed 520 shiny new solar panels across our site. Each panel is a little powerhouse, capable of generating up to 440 watts of clean, renewable energy.

On a sunny day, this system could produce over 200kW of electricity - that's a lot of sunshine working in our favour! Over the course of a year, we expect these panels to generate around 220,000 kWh, which is about the same amount of electricity used by 82 UK households.

Even better, this means we'll be cutting down CO² emissions by 43 tonnes a year - equivalent to taking 21 cars off the road - great news for the future of the young people here and for the environment!

Community Support

We would like to extend our heartfelt thanks to Mark Dickinson for generously volunteering his time and skills to create 12 therapy benches, and to Cheyne Charity for funding them.

These specially designed benches provide vital physiotherapy benefits, helping to strengthen core muscles, promote better posture, and improve spine health for children and young people.

Mark, an army veteran, was inspired to start making therapy equipment after witnessing the high cost of essential items for his granddaughter, Nathalene, who has cerebral palsy. Determined to make a difference, he founded Katnat Disabled Equipment, charging only for materials to ensure affordability.

Last month, Mark visited Chailey to test a prototype, and Seymour pupil Louis eagerly volunteered as the first to try it out! His mum, Jody Bishop, shared: "It's so nice to see Louis with some freedom and not strapped into his wheelchair. The physical benefits he gets from using the therapy bench are so important for his health, comfort, and wellbeing every day."

Following this visit, Mark made custom modifications to ensure the benches are truly bespoke - something that would not have been possible with off-the-shelf alternatives. <image><image><text>
